Dear Chairman Johnson and Ranking Member Crapo:

We, members of the National Parks Second Century Action Coalition, write to urge you to re-institute the Transit in Park (TRIP) program as part of the upcoming reauthorization of federal transit programs.

The National Parks Second Century Action Coalition is made up of organizations in the conservation, recreation, travel and tourism, historic preservation, and economic development communities dedicated to promoting the protection, restoration, and operation of the National Park System to benefit the health and well-being of current and future generations.

The TRIP program was established under SAFETEA-LU in 2005 in recognition that transportation access to and around our national parks and other federal lands cannot be effectively provided to visitors by highways alone. With nearly 300 million people visiting national parks a year, alternative transportation systems (ATS) can play an important role in relieving congestion, improving environmental quality, boosting local tourism economies, and enhancing visitor experience in our parks and public lands.

ATS encompass motorized land- and water-based transportation systems, including alternative fuel buses (running on fuels like propane, electricity, and natural gas), trolleys, water taxis, ferry boats, canal boats, and aerial tramways, as well as non-motorized modes of transportation such as biking and walking. Moreover, ATS provide traffic advisory using ITS technology.

Approximately \$162 million has been awarded under the TRIP program since its establishment. The authority for the TRIP program was repealed in 2012 with the enactment of MAP-21, however. The National Park Service alone has suffered a loss of support under the program estimated at \$18 million per year for transit, trails, and ITS.

When Congress eliminated the TRIP program in 2012, it was thought that the restructured Park Roads and Parkways Program, renamed as the Federal Lands Transportation Program (FLTP), would pick up the slack and cover the gap. That

assumption did not turn out to be correct, as the FLTP is geared principally toward road and bridge improvements.

It is now clear that a program like TRIP that specifically supports ATS is indispensable to providing comprehensive, reliable, and efficient transportation services in our national parks and federal lands. With 300 million visitors to our national parks that contribute an estimated \$14 billion in nearby communities every year, the benefits of the program far outweigh the costs. We, therefore, ask that the Banking Committee include the reinstitution of the TRIP program in its legislation to reauthorize federal transit programs.
