We strongly urge you to include robust funding for the Federal Lands Transportation Program (FLTP) and the Federal Lands Access Program (FLAP) in the Highway Trust Fund reauthorization. Maintaining our transportation systems on federal lands is of vital importance to the future public use and enjoyment of our federal lands, including national parks, forests and wildlife refuges.

Roads, bridges and transit systems on our federal lands serve as main arteries to major cities as well as nearly one billion recreation and tourism visits annually, yet funding levels for federal lands transportation programs have been largely unchanged for twenty years. As a result of chronic underfunding, an increasingly costly \$12 billion backlog of repairs to these important transportation systems exists.

These are federal lands and their transportation systems are wholly dependent upon federal funding; they do not have the benefit of support from state or local funding mechanisms.

The seriousness of the maintenance backlog of our federal lands transportation systems was most recently documented in the Federal Highway Administration's (FHWA) **2013 Status of the Nation's**

(http://www.fhwa.dot.gov/policy/2013cpr/). Half of the overall maintenance backlog in national parks – approximately \$6 billion – is transportation-related, and the lack of sustainable funding for our national forest roads is closing public access and causing social, safety and environmental conflicts. The situation is highlighted by the condition of paved roads in national forests: 75% are rated in "fair" or "poor" condition by FHWA.

Our federal lands not only provide important recreation opportunities, they are central to a \$650 billion per annum outdoor industry and to the nation's efforts to attract international visitors – about one in five international travelers visit national parks. The demand for access to these lands will only increase as the "gray wave" of baby boomers throng to the federal lands (every day for the next 19 years, 10,000 baby boomers will reach age 65.) These individuals represent 26 percent of the population—a population with age-related mobility issues approaching 85 million.

The Highway Trust Fund reauthorization must address the federal responsibility for providing safe access to our federal lands by providing adequate funds to meet and maintain public lands transportation systems, and our diverse coalition of recreation, conservation and tourism organizations asks for your action on this important issue. We are available and eager to discuss this topic with you.
