Introduction:

National parks, forests, and other outdoor places are home to amazing wildlife, trees, plants, and historic places. What will you find there?

Use this journal to keep track of some of the animals, plants, and sights you see! Remember to listen for interesting sounds, too. Natural sounds can be loud or soft, peaceful or exciting. They can give clues that there's something nearby that's cool to look at.

What You'll Need:

- Printable Journal
- Scissors
- **Stapler**
- Optional: Glue, crayons or colored pencils
- Optional: Book (called a "field guide") to help identify animals you see.

- 1. Print out this Journal.
- 2. Cut each page on the dotted lines so that you make four small journal pages from each large printed page.
- 3. Stack all of the journal pages together so that they are in order pages 1 through 16.
- 4. Staple the top left corner of the pages to make a book.
- 5. On each page of the journal, draw or paste a photo of something interesting you see. Write information about it underneath.
- 6. If you want more pages, print out some more copies and staple them to the back of your journal.




